IUSSI 2022 Congress Update

The North American Section is working on plans for the 2022 IUSSI Congress. The meeting will be held from 3-8 July, at the Marriott Marquis, San Diego Harbor. It should be a great venue. The hotel has extensive conference facilities, and is located directly across from San Diego's Gaslamp district. The trolley to Balboa Park and other local sites runs right past the hotel. Additionally, we will have a fantastic view of the July 4th fireworks on the harbor.

Our meeting program committee will be chaired by Stephen Pratt (Stephen.Pratt@asu.edu); the local hosting committee by James Nieh (jnieh@ucsd.edu); and the meeting secretary will be Jenny Jandt (jenny.jandt@otago.ac.nz). We additionally have diversity/inclusion, finance/fundraising, website, and graduate/postdoctoral committees. Committee assignments will be posted online as we develop them. If your members have particular interests in participating in one of those committees, please email Jenny Jandt or Jennifer Fewell (j.fewell@asu.edu).

At the recent NAS meeting, discussions on format and protocols produced an initial set of suggestions for the meeting. When the website officially goes online, we will open a "suggestion box" for further input.

Suggestions voted for by the NAS membership include:

- 1. Limiting presentations to one oral presentation per speaker regardless of category, plus one poster as presenter. Co-authorship on posters and oral presentations remains unlimited.
- 2. Including a balance of symposia and thematic contributed sessions throughout the meeting, rather than all symposia or all contributed sessions.
- 3. Symposia will include a limited number of invited core presentations, with additional presentations chosen by organizers from contributed papers, which can then be revised to fit the symposium.
- 4. Emphasis on diversity of presenters including career stage in choosing symposia and invited speakers.
- 5. Inclusion of a separate student competition symposium (oral presentations), with potential inclusion of a similar competition for early postdoctoral students

We are enthusiastic about making this an inclusive, scientifically productive, and enjoyable meeting; we look forward to hearing from you and to seeing you in San Diego.
