Call for Symposium Proposals – XX IUSSI International Congress 2026

We invite submissions for symposium proposals for the XX. IUSSI International Congress in 2026 (<u>https://iussi2026.org</u>). Each symposium will be allocated either 2 hours (8 short talks of 15 minutes each, incl. discussion) or 4 hours (16 talks) in the program. Symposium organizers are free to combine two short talks into one longer talk and invite up to 2 (for a 2-hour symposium or 4 (for a 4-hour symposium) speakers. Please note that due to budget constraints, neither symposium organizers nor speakers will receive honoraria, travel reimbursements, or other expenses.

Submission Deadline 31 March 2025

Symposium Proposal Requirements

You will need to provide:

- The names and email addresses of the primary organiser (for correspondence) and 1-2 co-organisers, who must commit to attending the meeting.
- The proposed symposium title.

- A brief justification (up to 200 words) explaining the significance and relevance of the proposed topic and your preferred symposium duration (2 or 4 hours). The symposium should be of general interest to the IUSSI community in order to encourage abstract submissions from a wide range of participants.
- If you would like to invite speakers, please mention how many and whom.

Balance in terms of gender, nationality, and career stage among invited speakers and organisers is expected. Organisers are also expected to maintain this balance when selecting additional presenters.

How to Submit a Proposal

- Email your proposal to judith.korb@biologie.uni-freiburg.de with the subject line "IUSSI 2026 Symposium Submission."
- The primary organiser must submit the proposal and will act as the main contact.

Evaluation Process

Your application will be reviewed by the Scientific Committee. Selected symposia will be announced by 1. June 2025.

News from Insectes Sociaux

Sadly, Miriam Richards has stepped down as associate editor as per January 2025. Miriam served as Editor-in-Chief for four years, taking over from Mike Breed at the IUSSI Congress in Brazil. When she stood down after the Congress in San Diego, Miriam stayed on as associate editor for which I have been extremely grateful because that meant I didn't have to feel too bad about asking her for help when I couldn't figure things out myself. I would like to thank Miriam for the many years she has dedicated to the journal, not only as Editor-in-Chief and associate editor, but also as author and reviewer. I will miss her.

Now is perhaps also the time to update the IUSSI community on the discussions I have had with a professional who assists journals with obtaining publishing agreements. In May of 2024 I met with Max Reuter, the Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of Evolutionary Biology. JEB had just switched from Wiley to Oxford University Press. The journal joined forced with Evolution and Evolution Letters and the three journals moved publishers together. Max brought me in contact with Paula Gantz from Paula Gantz Publishing Consultancy who assisted JEB, Evolution and Evolution Letters with the negotiations.

To cut a long story short, after a few (free, thank you Paula!) consultations, the conclusion

was drawn that our journal is simply too small to be attractive to publishers. Paula also did some sums and concluded that we actually get a pretty good deal from Springer. I, in consultation with Mark, therefore came to the decision that the IUSSI is best served by renewing our contract with Springer. Negotiations are currently ongoing.

I appreciate that many would prefer the journal to move to a not-for-profit publisher, but my reasoning is that we have to look after the IUSSI. Currently, the income generated from our journal is the only IUSSI income. Until that changes, or a miracle happens, the society is best served by sticking with Springer.
